Keynote Speakers





They both share backgrounds in gender equity education, and gender-based violence prevention and response.

Intro to B.C.'s Human Right Code

B.C.'s Office of the Human Rights Commissioner exists to address systemic human rights issues in our province by shifting laws, policies, practices and cultures. Our vision is a province free from inequality, discrimination and injustice where we uphold human rights for all and fulfil our responsibilities to one another. B.C.'s Human Rights Code, our provincial human rights law, exists to help protect everyone in British Columbia from discrimination in certain areas of daily life based on parts of our identity. Small Steps, Big Change: A CCUNESCO Workshop by Youth Advocacy Council Members

Our project presentation at the upcoming conference will focus on how small sustainable actions within schools can lead to significant impacts, emphasizing that everyone has the power to "Be the Change."

Laura is a retired teacher with over 30 years of teaching experience. After watching "Before the Flood" with her students on Earth Day in 2017, she decided it was time to explicitly incorporate climate change into her math classes. Her students wanted to build a greenhouse and what developed after that was a sequence of events leading to the HHS greenhouse, garden and food forest and many other climate action initiatives. In 2019, Laura was trained as a Climate Reality Leader and in 2022, she was awarded the Gaia Champion Teacher Award for excellence in climate action and youth empowerment. In 2022, Laura joined Learning for a Sustainable Future as an environmental educational consultant. She helps high school teachers incorporate climate action and the Sustainable Development Goals across the curriculum.

But did you know that in 2015, all of the countries in the United Nations agreed to tackle the biggest issues we are facing, and they developed 17 Sustainable Development Goals? Levelling up your Green Club: Taking Big Climate Action!





Their work lies at the intersections between ecology, art, and community building. Ashwini Krishnadhas (she/her) is a first-generation Tamil-speaking immigrant from Sri Lanka who is pursuing an MBA in Project Management. She is a part-time content creator and a UN volunteer, who is deeply passionate about social work, with a focus on women and youth empowerment. She enjoys working with Crossroads because it allows her to facilitate meaningful conversations and creates impact through impactful learning.

Courageous Conversations at the intersections of race, class, sexual orientation, and gender:

During this workshop youth facilitators Joshua Ralph and Ashwini Krishnadhas will walk students through a few of the scenarios (or: fraught interactions) featured in Crossroads Chronicles, a youth-created story-centred interactive graphic novel that helps build students' capacities to have courageous conversations across differences. These scenarios will touch on a range of issues related to Indigenous-specific racism, homophobia, transphobia and cissexism. As the scenarios unfold, the facilitators will engage students in a range of individual, small-group, and whole-class activities and games designed to elevate equity principles, foster empathy, inspire self-reflection and generate discussion.

: Moon -CGE



Transforming Global Issues into Local SDG Actions

In this interactive workshop, students will have the unique opportunity to meet international students and explore inspiring community action projects from around the world. Together, they will delve into the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) to identify which goals resonate most with them personally and within their communities. Through engaging discussions and collaborative brainstorming sessions, participants will craft actionable plans for youth-led projects aimed at addressing these SDGs in their own neighbourhoods. Additionally, the workshop will include a creative component where participants will get hands-on with collaging to visually express their ideas and aspirations for a sustainable future.

Susan is a curriculum writer and educator with over 25 years of experience (Canada, USA, Switzerland). Her first teaching assignment at the UN School in New York inspired a career dedicated to creating school-based integrated arts programs that encourage children to explore various mediums for the purpose of self-expression and to help youth imagine a better world. More recently Susan held a position as an Artist in Residence in the AIRS program with the Vancouver School Board. She is currently working with the UNESCO Schools Network.

See the Earth First

What are the kinds of photos youth are expected to produce? This workshop challenges students to consider the various genres of photography available to them and how they might use photography for good. Our discussion will ask the questions: What if for one day, students across Canada shift the lens of their camera to focus on our beautiful planet? Can sharing images help people feel more connected to the natural world and contribute to environmental advocacy?

The workshop will take place both in a classroom (dialogue and critique) and outdoors (image making). Students are encouraged to bring outerwear that will keep them warm and dry for up to an hour. A class set of cameras will be on site. The use of personal cameras is also welcome.

Deblekha and Nefertari

Deblekha Guin

Deblekha Guin (she/her) is the biracial (South Asian/Scottish and Irish) founder of Access to Media Education Society. Guin has co-visioned and coordinated 50+ distinct participatory media arts production programs that have engaged over 2000 youth from equity-deserving communities, and was recognized for her extensive BIPOC-centred, intergenerational and intersectional creative community-building work through an "Intercultural Trust Award" at the BC Multiculturalism and Anti-racism Awards in 2020.

Nefertari Amore Azaria Bianchini-Lubin

Nefertari Amore Azaria Bianchini-Lubin (she/her) is a biracial woman (Haitian/European) who has been delivering Crossroads workshops in lower mainland schools for the past year and a half. This work has solidified Neffy's belief in the value of sharing stories about her own learning journey and lived experiences of racism and classism with others, and the importance of working together to grow our capacities to have courageous conversations across differences.

Crossroads Chronicles: An Interactive Teacher Resource

Workshop participants will be introduced to key elements of Crossroads Chronicles, a youth-created story-centred interactive resource that helps build students' capacities to have courageous conversations at the intersections of race, class, sexual orientation, and gender. Peer facilitator Neffy Lubin and Project Director Deblekha Guin will guide you through a host of debrief activities and reflective prompts as you witness raw and relatable scenarios that draw attention to microaggressions and fumbles that can occur in everyday interactions. They will also offer insights into the rationale behind the workshop design, and share stories of how students have responded to the workshops and related concepts and activities to date. All workshop attendees will get free access to the game, and the associated Teacher's Guide (which includes glossaries, workshop maps, templates, and a range of extended learning activities).



David Zandvliet

David Zandvliet is a Professor in the Faculty of Education at SFU and the UNESCO Chair in Biocultural Diversity and Education. He is the founding Director of the Institute for Environmental Learning & has held Associate memberships in the Faculty of Science and the Faculty of Environment at SFU. David has published articles in international journals and presented papers on six continents and in over 21 countries

Shannon Leddy


Dr. Shannon Leddy is a member of the Métis Nation of BC, a former high school teacher, and an associate professor at UBC, whose practice focuses on using transformative pedagogies in decolonizing and Indigenizing teacher education. She is the Co-Chair of the Institute for Environmental Learning, and co-author of the book, Teaching where you are: weaving slow and Indigenous pedagogies.

What Is Environmental Learning?

In this interactive session, we will share some of the research outcomes from our PICS-funded project, Infusing Climate Education into the BC Curriculum, including revisions to the 2007 Environmental Learning & Experience Curriculum Guide. We'll then engage in experiential activities that model inquiry and stimulate discussion about two-eyed seeing, experiential learning and guided inquiry.

Join the session to: explore barriers to climate education among teachers, discuss best practices for place and land-based approaches to climate education, and increase awareness of Indigenous knowledge and worldviews related to environmental learning practices
